About 100 years ago, the group of artists 'Der Blaue Reiter' (Blue Rider) instigated a **revolution of colours and abstractions** - and this happened in the quiet Murnau Alps!

Henning Sieverts implements the glowing colours of the Blaue Reiter in bright timbres.

He selected known and unknown "Blaue Reiter" images and composed a piece for each one of them.

So Franz Marc's "Yellow Cow" receives the BSE Blues and Wassily Kandinsky's "St. George" is chasing his kite in frantic swing.

"Henning Sieverts' Blauer Reiter" is **also a visual experience, because a projecter shows each painting on a wall. Colour-tones and timbre become one!**
